### **Latinx Heritage Month**

In 1968 President Lyndon B. Johnson proclaimed the week beginning September 15, 1968 to be National Hispanic Heritage Week. Presidential Proclamation 6021 in 1989 extended the heritage week into a month, from September 15-October 15.

"Hispanic Heritage Month (HHM) takes place each year to recognize the accomplishments of, challenges facing, and rich diversity among the Hispanic diaspora in the United States (US). Notably, HHM represents an ideal forum for medical trainees, physicians, and other members of our healthcare system to understand the experiences of Hispanic patients and physicians, who together comprise 18% of the general US population and represent the country's largest non-white ethno-racial group.

Despite their representation in the general population, in 2018, Hispanics represented approximately 6.5% of medical students, 6.3% of physicians, and 4.0% of faculty. As healthcare providers and recipients, Hispanics face significant and unique health issues and disparities. However, these issues often remain undiscussed in traditional medical school curricula. Thus, the academic community must collaborate to design, implement, and evaluate practices to facilitate the reduction of Hispanic disparities in academic, professional, and patient outcomes."
